Trails Now: Bridle-& Hiking Trail Fund

The Fund is managed by the Conservancy for Cuyahoga Valley National Park to preserve bridle trails and green spaces in Cuyahoga Valley National Park.

Horses trails and greenspaces must be protected and enhanced if we want to preserve cross training opportunities and access for ourselves and future equestrians.

Northeast Ohio has an excellent network of trails that need continuous work for ongoing and safe equestrian use. "Cuyahoga Valley National Park (CVNP) boasts 125 miles of multipurpose trails that are used and loved by thousands every year. As the 7th most-visited national park in America in 2020, CVNP continues to see increased visitation from hikers, joggers, riders, and bikers who love our trails."

As a 501 c 3 Education Organization, NODA encourages a high standard of horsemanship and management which includes cross training and exposing our horses to a variety of environments for mental and physical health and wellbeing of the horse. For this reason, the board of the Northern Ohio Dressage Association feels this kind of donation is a great fit. The new trailheads and improvements to trailheads include equestrian access and parking as well as improvements to bridle trails.

"Through The Trails Now: Bridle-Hiking Trail Fund, donors provide financial support that will enable the National Park Service to make much-needed improvements to bridle-hiking trails in CVNP.

Repairing/cleaning trail bridges
Cleaning/installing trail drainage features
Improving trail signs.


During this time, Jackie Smith offered optional Mountain

An Auditors Perspective on the Open Clinic with Richard Williams

Shade Tree Farm July 10 & 11, 2022 by Patti Valencic, NODA Education Committee Co-chair

This time when Richard Williams came to town for the Dressage Professional Initiative, Session 2, amateurs got in on the action with their own clinic on days three and four.



There were 7 rides each day and up to as many as 7 auditors with Q & A session with Richard during lunch. Horses and riders ranged from beginners to the more experienced.

Richard did a lot of shoulder-in work with several of the riders. He

said it is the most important dressage movement. It teaches the horse engagement, collection, straightness,

and gives the rider control of the horse's body. It is preparation for pirouettes. He always had them begin on a 10 meter circle to get the correct bend. He reminded us to ask our instructors



to break it down and explain it in depth if we do not understand how to use our bodies effectively. He also had some riders do haunches out on a circle to really get the horse "sitting down." Richard met the horse and rider where they were at and pinpointed solutions to issues

right from the start.



With seven riders, each day, Richard had time to demonstrate in hand work and lunge line. He stressed the importance of being quiet and calm and slowly earning the horse's trust. He said to evaluate footfalls to see if the horse is tracking up and even

overstepping.



Some of my takeaways from the clinic include:

- -stay in the present, leave worries behind.
- -breathe and stay calm.
- -appreciate the movement and feel how your horse is moving.
- -do lots of transitions within gaits and between gaits to improve lightness. They are the most commented upon movement in dressage tests and account for a great deal of your overall score.
- -don't let anyone limit you!
- -you are a teacher too and should read dressage books, "your mind must know more than your body can do."
- -do cavalletti or hill work to help your horse lift his shoulders.
- -when you horse passes gas, he is releasing tension (lol).

Save the Dates

November 3-4, 2022: Dressage Professionals Initiative Session 3 will be held on November 3-4, 2022 at Flow Equestrian located on Stafford Road in Chagrin Falls. This program is open to all professionals and will cost \$200 for the two day session. Registration will open mid-September.

November 5-6, 2022: Open Clinic with Richard Williams which will be open to all riders. For the most benefit Richard suggests riding both days. Member price: \$175 for a lesson for one day, \$350 for lessons both days. Flow Equestrian. Auditors are welcome \$25. Registration will open mid-September.

January 7, 2023: New Test Seminar with Margaret Freeman "S" judge

USDF FAQ's - What is an adult amateur?

The term "Adult" within USDF membership applies to all members age 21 and over. The term adult amateur applies primarily for competition purposes and is defined within the rules of the US Equestrian (USEF) that provides the body of rules by which dressage is governed. Any questions regarding official AA status should be directed to USEF.

Am I a USEF Adult Amateur?

USDF maintains a list of members who are designated as Adult Amateurs with USEF. Check this list, updated weekly, to confirm your current USEF Adult Amateur status or go to USEF's website to look up your membership information.

Can I participate in the L Program?

Yes! You can even be an L Graduate and judge schooling shows while keeping your USEF AA status. We encourage all of our members to attend at least the A, B and C (Part1) sessions; the educational content is superb. L Graduates with distinction can even move on to USEF judging programs without changing their AA status. (GR1306.3.i.).

Can I participate in the Instructor/Trainer Program?

Yes! We encourage you to participate, audit or be a demo rider in the workshops. All the education is available to you!

Can I go to Trainers Conference?

Adult amateurs can attend and apply to be a demo rider at Trainers Conference. This is an FEI level concentrated program with attendance criteria and adult amateurs who meet these criteria may attend.

Does USDF have any adult amateur specific education programs?

To us having a USEF Adult Amateur card, or not having it, should not be a roadblock to learning for our education programs. We don't want to turn away anyone that wants to learn because of their USEF designation. We do not have any programs that require a USEF Adult Amateur card to attend.

I'm on a tight budget; how can USDF help?

The Education Membership level is less expensive and a good option for riders who don't need a higher level of membership to qualify for competition or awards. Benefits include USDF Education Library/Online Education and our online magazine. You can also listen to our Podcasts and subscribe to our YouTube Channel. Volunteering is a great way to learn at a greatly reduced cost or free to expand your dressage education. Contact your local GMO and let them know you want to help. The Dressage Foundation has several grants available to enable riders to continue their dressage education.

Kim Gentry Bit Fitting Clinic Review

Sandpiper Stables

July 8 and 9, 2022

The Kim Gentry Bit Fitting Clinic was held at Sandpiper Sta- "boom" there it was, he completely changed. He was bles in Portersville, Pennsylvania on July 8th & 9th. I would like to extend a big "Thank you" to NODA for sponsoring the lunches for both days.

We had two full days of riders and their horses, sixteen in total of all shapes and sizes including several cute ponies! Everyone learned so much about the importance of bits and how they fit or don't fit in our horses' mouths.

Each ride started with Kim watching our normal warm up and after several minutes Kim stopped the rider and asked them to dismount. She asked

questions regarding what the rider was feeling and how they thought their horse was going. Kim palpated the horse's mouth to determine the shape and how much room there was in the mouth, size of the tongue and the condition of the teeth. Kim helped the rider to learn what to feel for and she chose a bit based on the horse's mouth. The rider popped back on and rode around to get a feel for that particular bit. If it didn't feel right, then the process was repeated. In some cases, Kim would only have to try two bits to find the bit the horse loved. Other times, Kim would try several bits until the horse showed noticeable improvement in their gait, feel, and contact. Even as an auditor you could see the changes in the horse. Their movement developed more cadence and their toplines were rounder. Plus, Kim was great explaining what she was doing and why to everyone that attended the clinic. Everyone learned so much from Kim about the horse's month and how the right bit allowed the horse to move more freely because the bit was more comfortable in his month was not restricting his movement.

"When I was watching others' riding in the clinic, I heard them all say how much differently they felt their horses were moving in the new bits. Until I got on my horse, I didn't really realize how much difference the right bit made. I rode my GRP who is seven years old, and I had never really thought about how bits would affect their way of going until then. I have struggled with this little guy being stiff in the mouth and more so to the left. The final bit that Kim chose for him was a complete game changer!! I got back on him, rode away across the diagonal and

lighter in the contact, reacted so much quicker to my aids and he started to raise his shoulders and come up off the forehand with ease and the best part was I didn't have to work for it!!! It was amazing and out of this world, and I

was one happy rider."

It was a full participation clinic as Kim involved the auditors by explaining what she was doing and why. I am sure that everyone learned so much at the clinic, and many auditors asked if I could get Kim back.

I am happy to say that I was able to get on Kim's schedule again this year and

will have her back on October the 14th & 15th.

Again, thank you NODA for sponsoring our clinic and I hope to see some of you at Sandpiper Stables in October!



Kim Gentry has quickly become highly sought after for her unique clinics which provide riders with the ability to try many different bits and bridles in sessions guided by Kim. She works with riders oneon-one in a traditional clinic format and also welcomes student/ trainer combinations enabling them to work comfortably as they would in a lesson. The clinics are structured in a way so that they are educational and are ideal for a fun and beneficial barn clin-

July 8 and 9 my calendar read: "DPI, 8.30 -5.30." The "smiley face" next to it expressing my hopes of an interesting course for trainers; totally up my alley!

Up front Danielle Menteer had already gathered what each of us would like to know more about, who could add to these days in any way (ex. Schooling horse) and we were to fill out a questionnaire and submit that to Richard Williams. This made me feel very engaged and the way everyone pitched in already gave an impression of camaraderie.

The days started by making sure my horse simulator named "Joker" and all the items I always use in my lessons on him got packed. I normally travel back home to the Netherlands for such training, so the drive being under an hour already felt like such a gift! It simply wouldn't take out too much out of my daily life and still be able to invest in myself as an instructor.

The gorgeous location at Shade Tree Farm was awaiting

all of us. We spent the morning introducing ourselves and Richard went thru his interactive presentation. He made it clear that it was our course, he was there to fulfil our needs.

After the delicious lunch, that was generously donated by Jeni Gaffney, Richard had a short individual moment with each of us, again ready to answer any specific questions and guiding each of us in the right direction.

The afternoon was filled with some demo riders and a few of us on horses made available by Sarah Freeman. All completely different horses and riders and every aspect, from biomechanics in the riders and horse as well as how to explain the specific exercise was to be executed. Although we initially didn't know each other, many phone numbers got exchanged. The Cleveland area is heading towards a new generation of trainers that are in it for the

long haul; helping horses by helping the riders and what one trainer doesn't know, we now have a network to lean on.
